The Covid-19 pandemic has created havoc throughout the world. In Kenya, some students were able to return to schools on October 5th. In this edition we will highlight two young men who have excelled in the academic realm.

Eric Mutea arrived at the home in 2016 and is now a 14 year old in class 8 at Gikumene Primary School. Each year, Eric is in the top ten of his class. His goals include a career in mechanical engineering after university. At the home, Eric's favorite spot is the library. His hobbies include reading story books and football (soccer). His favorite foods are chapati chips and rice.

Much of Eric's time is spent studying for the KCPE (Kenya Comprehensive Primary Examination), which will be held in April 2021. This grueling multiple-day exam includes Math, English A, English B (writing), Science, Kiswahili A, Kiswahili B (writing), Social Studies and Religious Education. The results of the KCPE determine where or if a student can attend secondary school (high school). Many youth who receive high marks attend boarding school. The Kenyan government currently covers a small portion of boarding school tuition.

We wish Eric the best of luck on the KCPE. Eight of our children will be taking the KCPE this year. Eric is mentored by Yvette and Lawrence Hohler of Port Jefferson, New York. Eric is the Hohler's second mentee.

Robinson Kithinji is currently a Form 4 student at Kirige Secondary School. Form 4 is the equivalent of our senior year of high school. He arrived at the home in 2017 and is currently 17 years old. Robinson has consistently scored in the top ten of his secondary school class.

Robinson has his eyes on a career as a neurosurgeon. Obviously, this means many more years of education. Robinson will take the KCSE (Kenya Comprehensive Secondary Exam) in April, and his score on the KCSE will determine the post-secondary institution he will be able to attend.

The KCSE is the only determining factor for post-secondary education. Unlike our SAT or ACT, the KCSE is not a factor but the only factor for admission. GPA and secondary school grades do not determine post-secondary admission. The KCSE is a multiple part multiple day examination. The current structure is thirteen subjects over three and a half days.

At the home, Robinson loves to play football (soccer). The new football goals are a welcome addition for Robinson and his brothers and sisters. He is also a major music fan. Favorite foods include chapati, rice and pizza. Robinson is mentored by Lorna and Gene Mann of Bayville, New York.

We wish Robinson good luck on the KCSE and on his long journey to becoming a neurosurgeon. There will be seven youth from the home taking the KCSE this year.

A long-standing tradition at the home is to carry the high scorers on the KCPE and KCSE up the home's hill on the shoulders of their brothers and sisters. Let's hope that both Eric and Robinson get carried up the hill!


Sheltering Fun


News from the Board

Both boards were able to carry out a highly successful 16th Annual Bi-Continental Run. Veronica Kirima, the home's director, and Kenyan board members held their portion in honor of founder Joseph Kirima, who passed away on January 30, 2020.

Veronica Kirima is working hard to supervise the planting of crops on our farm acreage. The yields from the farm reduce our dependence on market prices for the food staples needed to feed the children. The farm produces maize, arrowroot, onions and greens. The children from the home assist in the planting and harvesting of the crops.

On the U.S. side, fundraising has been extremely difficult during the pandemic. Many of our fundraisers have been postponed or cancelled. Our craft fairs, a source of income and publicity, have been totally eliminated. Our St. Anselm's Basket Raffle has been postponed indefinitely. Our 4th annual gala has been postponed until July 24, 2021.

We are extremely hopeful that 2021 will allow both boards to return to some semblance of normalcy. The one consistent factor has been the steady and consistent generosity of our supporters on both sides of the pond. Together we will get through this pandemic as will the children under our care. We want to give special thanks to our many long-standing donors who make all our work possible. You are changing the lives of some of the world's most vulnerable children . . . forever!!

Over the years, one glaring issue for our orphanage has been the lack of safe, reliable transportation for the children. We have lacked a vehicle to transport the children to schools, shopping and medical visits. Transportation safety is critical in Meru as the common means of travel--walking, matatus (minibus), boda boda (motorcycles) and lorries (trucks) can be dangerous. Indeed, over the years, two of our children -- Glory and Michell -- have been killed on the road not too far from the home.

While having our own vehicle would not provide all the needed transport all the time, it would ensure greater safety for more of our children more of the time. Additionally, a new vehicle will also hopefully help us reach our goal of self-sustainability as hired transportation is a significant part of our monthly budget expenses.

We are very fortunate to have received a \$10,000 grant from a "secret" donor to help purchase a vehicle. We are very excited to announce two additional partnerships on the vehicle. An anonymous donor offered to match the first \$5,000 in donations to the vehicle appeal. This matching donation will be available until June 30,2021. NYU/PDK (New York University/Phi Delta Kappa) has pledged to donate \$2,000 to the vehicle fund.

Mombasa Toyota will provide us with a new Hiace minivan (16 seats) for \$39,000. If we cannot raise enough funds, we will purchase the best used vehicle possible. Kyle Spillane is in the process of setting up a Go Fund Me page for the vehicle appeal.

Our 16th Bi-Continental Run had a very different look from previous years due to the pandemic. The U.S. side was virtual with two small gatherings of actually runners/walkers on October 24th. The Kenyan component with actual runners and walkers took place on October 25th.

U.S. race director Ed Hyshiver stated, "Considering this year's Covid-19 circumstances, we had very good community and financial support on both sides of the globe. In Kenya, approximately 150 participated in a walk from the home through town and back. Shortly thereafter, another 23 runners ran a typically Kenyan fast 5K to once again win the Bi-Continental competition. It was wonderful to see the overwhelming support there for the home."

The Kenyan side had a very different tone as well. The Kenya run/walk was held in honor of the founder of the home Joseph Kirima who passed away on January 31st 2020. The Kenyans had far more ceremony than ever before including huge banners, tents and performances all dedicated to the memory of Joseph. In addition, the Kenyans provide food to all attendees. Fundraising stickers were sold, and the Kenyans made a considerable profit which will be used for improvements to the Joseph Kirima Dormitory.

Plans are already underway for the 17th Annual Bi-Continental Run, according to race director Ed "Fast Eddie" Hyshiver.




